

CCW Disqualifier List

PLEASE NOTE: This list is not meant to be a completely exhaustive list, merely to provide an overview of the most common disqualifying offenses. Laws do change, so please call our office or speak to an attorney if you are unsure of your eligibility.

DISQUALIFYING Criminal History / Legal Background.

Convicted, or Adjudicated a Delinquent Child, or Pending Indictment or Criminal Charges for:

- **ANY** Felony offense
- Any Drug offense (Felony OR Misdemeanor, except for Minor Misdemeanor drug possession or Minor Misdemeanor Drug Paraphernalia)
- Any Misdemeanor of Violence (Assault, Aggravated Menacing, Menacing by Stalking, Menacing, Inciting Violence, Riot, Inducing Panic, Domestic Violence, Endangering Children)
- Negligent Assault
- Falsifying Concealed Carry application/having revoked CCW license
- Assault on a Peace Officer
- Conspiracy or attempt to commit, or complicity in committing, any of the above offenses

There is NO time limit on these offenses. If you have been convicted, or adjudicated a delinquent child, it will always be a disqualifier. If charges are pending, and are dismissed, they are no longer disqualifiers, provided they fall outside of the time constraints below.

Convicted, or Adjudicated a Delinquent Child within the past 3 years:

- Misdemeanor crime of violence except **RESISTING ARREST** or **ASSAULT ON POLICE OFFICER**
- Conspiracy or attempt to commit, or complicity in committing, any of the above offenses

Convicted, or Adjudicated a Delinquent Child in the past 5 years:

- Two (2) or more convictions or adjudications for Assault or Negligent Assault

Convicted, or Adjudicated a Delinquent Child in the past 10 years:

- Resisting Arrest
- Including complicity, or attempt to commit any of the above offenses

Other Disqualifiers:

- ACTIVE Civil Protection Orders, Temporary Protection Order (TPO), or Protection Order from ANY State
- Dishonorable discharge from the military
- Legally unable to purchase a firearm for any reason
- Fugitive from justice
- Drug dependent, in danger of drug dependence, or a chronic alcoholic
- Adjudicated mentally incompetent
- Committed to any mental institution
- Been found by a court to be a mentally ill person, subject to hospitalization by court order
- Involuntary patient for purposes other than observation
